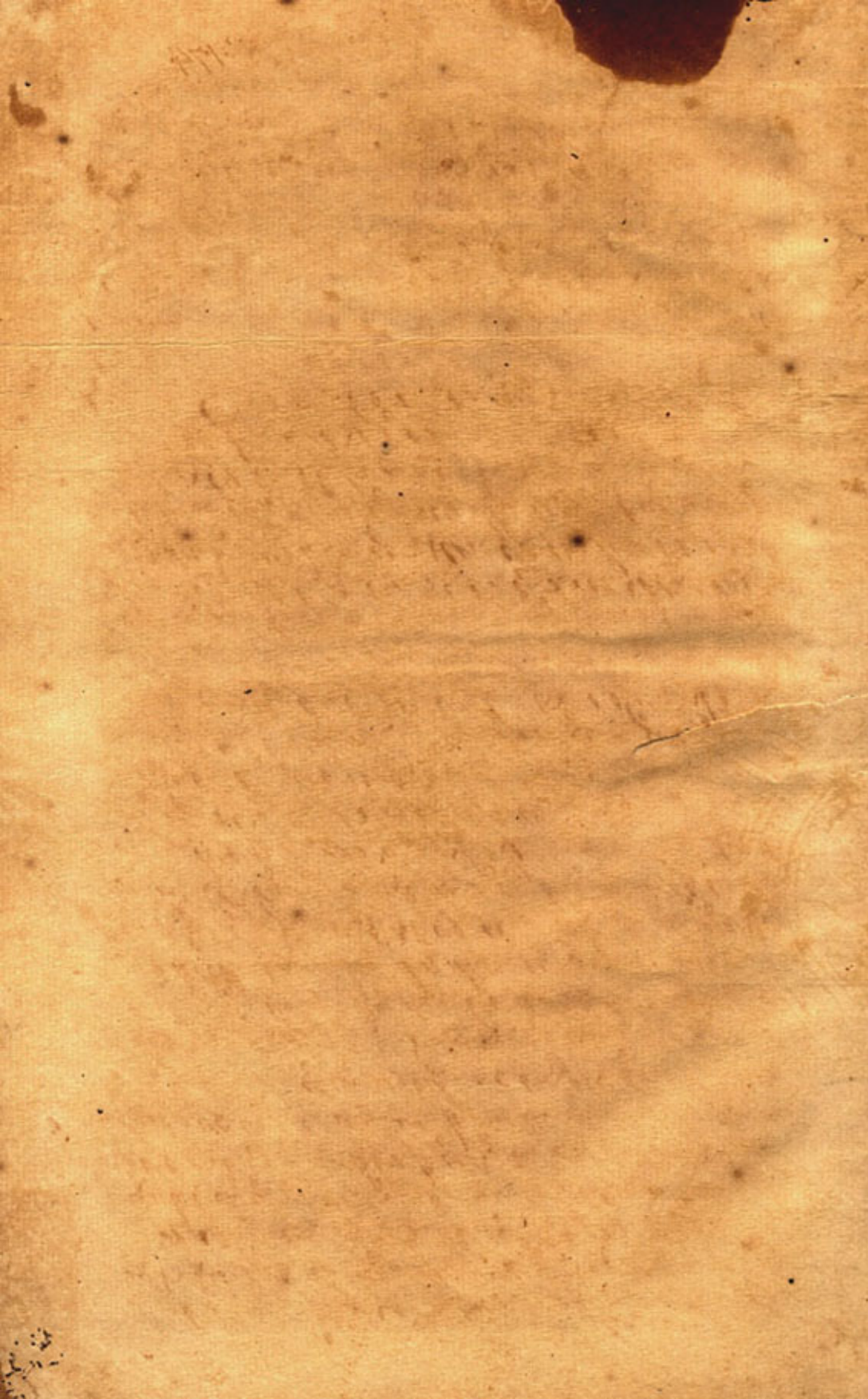

The first day of the world was

The first of these is the fact that the
